Sierra Pacific Synod Assembly

The Sierra Pacific Synod Assembly was held on September 15-17, 2023 in Burlingame, California. Pastor Mike, Ken Beaton, and I attended the assembly as the representatives of St. Paul's. Traci Angel also attended as a volunteer because she was nominated as an At-Large Member of the Synod Council. Although we were rooting for Traci, she did not win, but the person who did will be a very good member of the Synod Council. Traci also had the opportunity to network with other members of churches around our area. I am hoping through some of her conversations we will have a better connection with them.

Our main goal at the assembly was to elect a new bishop. Reverand Jeff R. Johnson was elected on Sunday morning on the 5th ballot. He is the first openly gay man to be elected bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod. He currently serves as Pastor of University Lutheran Chapel and as a member of the Spiritual Care Team at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, California. He was ordained in 1990. He has served as a San Francisco Conference Dean, served on the Synod Council and Synod Executive Committee and has been a champion for full participation of the LGBTQ community within the church. Colleagues might describe Pastor Johnson's leadership style as "flexible, honest, bold and collaborative." He draws his strength from the spiritual practice called Communion. My general impression of him is someone who encourages us to think outside the box and likes to work in team leadership. As he begins his six-year term, I ask that you keep him in your prayers. He has a big task ahead and will need all of the help he can get!

The other main event of the assembly was to right a wrong that happened to a Spanish speaking congregation Iglesia Luterana Santa Maria Peregrina in December 2021. Although I do not have all of the details, I know the Pastor was abruptly removed from the congregation, and they were left alone to fend for themselves. After a traumatizing and stressful 2022 Synod Assembly where there were out cries of racism, suffering and injustice, Bishop Megan Rohrer resigned, and an interim bishop Claire Burkat was appointed by the Bishop of the ELCA. An investigation was launched by Bishop Burkat to review the facts, processes and dynamics that led up to the divisive 2022 Synod Assembly and also a few years preceding the delayed retirement of Bishop Mark Holmerud and the impact of the three-year pandemic.

At the assembly, the Synod Council offered a sincere public apology for the events and terrible hurt that was caused to the Pastor, his family, and the Iglesia Luterana Santa Maria Peregrina community. The apology was spoken in English and Spanish. Thankfully, the apology was accepted. The church was received as a roster church into the Sierra Pacific Synod and the ELCA, and their Pastor has completed his candidacy and is now available for call.

Bishop Burkat started her service in June 2022 and will end her service on November 1, 2023 when the newly elected Bishop Johnson will take over. The assembly expressed its deep appreciation to Bishop Burkat for all of her hard work, wisdom, generosity, humor, and leadership during this troubled time in the Synod's history. I believe that because of her deep love of God and her gifts from the Holy Spirit, the Synod will begin to heal from the wounds that have been festering for so many years. The theme of the assembly was "Broken yet Whole" with a reference to 2 Corinthians 13:11, which reads, "Finally, siblings, rejoice. Strive for full restoration, encourage one another, and be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love and peace will be with you." The logo depicts the word "Broken" shattered like a piece of a windshield after a severe accident. The word also has a cross stretched partially through it and the words "yet whole" just below.

I believe the theme of the assembly could also apply to our church and ourselves. As some of us have been able to return to worship in person or online, we look at some of the empty seats that were once filled with members who have not come back or have moved away or who have found their heavenly home. We continue to struggle with our finances and meet our obligations to our staff, maintenance of our building, and outreach to our neighbors and community around us. My friends, we are not alone in this struggle. The average worshiping attendance in the 181 congregations of our Synod is fifty-two (52). Several churches are going through or have gone through Holy Closure, and the members who were left are grieving as they try to find other worshiping communities. Some churches are sharing a pastor or have contemplated merging. One individual I spoke with said they are sharing their church building with another inter-faith community and another individual from another small church in the most southern part of our Synod in California said they can only afford to have a Pastor preach twice a month.

My dear church friends in Christ, listen to the words to a church in Corinth 2000 years ago who were also broken and shattered:

God says, "REJOICE!"

God says, "Strive for full restoration."

God says, "Encourage one another."

God says, "Be of one mind."

God says, "Live in peace."

God says, "I am the master artist, and I have an incredible, fantastic, amazing and extraordinary design in store for you."

We are made whole in Christ!

Church Council meeting September 21, 2023

The church council met with AJ Feuling, Superintendent of Carson City School District. A meeting with the Carson City planning director was planned for September 25th to discuss the possible movement of the plot line, so that the school district could purchase two acres of our back property. This would be a much cheaper procedure than subdividing the lot. From there, the school district will hire an appraiser to assess the value and determine an asking price. It will take a couple of meetings and procedures of the school board to approve of the offer. When the offer is made, I will be calling for a special congregation meeting. The school district is planning to use the land to create an additional practice field for soccer and other outdoor sports. The field will be open to the high school and other community organizations through the high school parking lot. We asked the Superintendent if the field could be closed on Sunday mornings, and he agreed.

Council spent a lot of time considering the designated line items (liabilities) on the balance sheet. Many of the line items are no longer valid liabilities or have been used in the past to offset general budget expenses. Several motions were made to "clean" up the balance sheet and to be able to recognize our *true* liabilities. Our treasurer, Sharon Gesick, will make journal (accounting) entries based on the motions to correct the liabilities as there are presented. As one of the first priorities, council authorized two adult youth advisors and Sharon to open a separate checking account for the youth group. We will transfer the funds, as they are available, to this checking account for the youth group. Council was delighted to approve the appointment of Charlotte LaCombe as the Church Historian. Charlotte approached me several weeks ago asking if she could volunteer to maintain and preserve our historical records. Thank you, Charlotte!

Due to council members' busy calendars, we moved our next Council meeting to October 12th at 6:00 pm.

Thank you to so many of you who continue to step forward to serve and support the church. God Bless You!

I ask the congregation to unite in prayer each night at 8:00 p.m.

Loving God, be with us and guide us during this time of discernment. Fill our leaders with your wisdom. Keep us mindful of the work you would have us do. Lead us and guide us O Lord to be about the work of your kingdom even as the search for a new pastor continues. Bless all who have taken on extra responsibility and fill them with a sense of your love and presence. We pray in your Son's name, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.



2023 Sierra Pacific Assembly

"Broken Yet Whole"

"Finally, siblings, rejoice. Strive for full restoration, encourage one another, be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love and peace will be with you." (2 Corinthians 13:11)

Our Synod Assembly theme, chosen by the assembly planning team last year when this synod was conflicted and in deep distress, was shared in light of a letter St. Paul wrote to the troubled people assembled at the church in Corinth almost 2000 years ago.

Didn't the Holy Spirit show up powerfully at our Assembly?

How could we have imagined when this theme was chosen, that St. Paul's blessing for the Corinthian church was to freely flow through all three days of our Assembly?

+ Did we not rejoice, especially as we worshipped, and joyfully danced at the banquet Saturday night?

+ Did we not witness the full restoration of a community of believers to the roster, after sharing our regrets and apologies for hurting them and their pastor?

+ Did we not sincerely encourage one another as we prayed and deliberated on the mission of God on our synod territory?

+ Did we not experience being of one mind after reflecting, listening, discussing, voting, and spiritually discerning which pastor would be raised up as our bishop?

+ And didn't the people of God from every conference of our synod eat, drink, worship, and live together in the peace of Christian community for three days?



Reverend Jeff Johnson Elected Bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod

Jeff R. Johnson of Berkeley, California was elected on September 17th to serve a six-year term as Bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

The Bishop-elect has served as Pastor of University Lutheran Chapel of Berkeley, California and as a member of the Spiritual Care Team at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, Berkeley, California, since 2013.

Reverend Johnson received his Bachelor of Arts in History and a Bachelor of Arts in German from California Lutheran University, Thousand Oaks, in 1984 and his Master of Divinity from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in 1988. Johnson was ordained in 1990.

Reverend Johnson's installation details have yet to be determined.

The History of Reformation Sunday

Our story begins in the 16th century – 1517, to be exact. Bear with us here – what follows is a very simplified explanation of complex theological, political, and economic events that all coincided.

Across Europe, the Roman Catholic Church was engaged in one of the greatest fundraisers in all of history.

If a person – out of contrition for their sins and as a sign of repentance – made a financial gift to help with the building Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome, then the church would furnish that person with a certificate acknowledging that gift and promising that they or their loved ones would be freed from a portion of the misery expected in the afterlife.

In short, the church at that time taught that even those bound for heaven had to be cleansed of their earthly sins and this cleansing (purging) in the afterlife took place in a place called Purgatory. The certificates offered by the church (called "Indulgences") promised to lessen this time of cleansing for oneself or others who have already died. There were some very nuanced explanations of this practice at the time. And there were other very crass explanations that basically amounted to people paying to be forgiven.

November 1st was an important day for the selling and buying of these indulgences, known as All Saints' Day on the church's calendar. The day before a German Monk named Martin Luther posted a list of 95 Theses – 95 reasons that he objected to this practice of selling indulgences. Along with other writings by Martin Luther, those 95 Reasons went viral.

Luther insisted that we are not forgiven because of anything we do – including the buying of Indulgences or doing enough good work. *Instead, we are forgiven because of who God is.* We are loved and forgiven because God is full of grace and mercy.

His teachings and writings got Martin Luther kicked out of the church. But he didn't go alone. Others agreed with him, and after his death those who agreed with Luther became known as Lutherans and also as Protestants. Every Protestant church traces their roots back to this moment in history.

Why Does Reformation Sunday Matter?

October 31st, 1517 was a long time ago. Why does it continue to matter and be remembered in our churches today?

1. Reformation Sunday gives us a chance to tell our story – a chance to remember.

We all have a family story – how we got to this point in history. Stories about parents and grandparents, about the things that have shaped our families over the years. Reformation Sunday is a day when we remember and re-tell the family stories of our faith. Stories about men and women who came before us and taught us about the faith. Stories about people who risked everything so that we would be able to gather and worship in the manner that we do.

2. Reformation Sunday reminds us of the most important things.

Throughout the year we preach about many things in church. About how we live our daily lives, the choices we make, the habits of our faith. On Reformation Sunday we are brought back to the most important thing – the thing that compelled Luther and others to risk their lives.

On Reformation Sunday, we return to the core of our faith: **God loved us first, and God continues** to shower us with grace and mercy.


3. Reformation Sunday challenges us to do better.

Through re-telling our story and returning to the core of our faith, Reformation Sunday prods us to do better. We are called to be more loving and grace-filled, because God was gracious and merciful to us. We are called to repent of the times that we have placed barriers that have kept others from hearing the Good News. We are called to remember that all that we are is a gift from God.

In the church in Wittenberg where Martin Luther preached, there is a wonderful painting. In it Luther stands in the pulpit on the right-hand side, and the people stand on the left. In between people and the preacher is Christ on the cross. Reformation Sunday is a reminder that this is the bedrock of our faith – the grace and mercy given to us in Jesus Christ. Keeping the most important thing in the center of the picture is the only hope for our faith and for this community that we call "church."

The youth need your **HELP!** We need trunks for the children to trick or treat out of, so please join the fun and sign-up to have your truck open for treating!




