In the early church, January 6 was a day for baptism. The central significance of Epiphany is that Christ came as the Light of the World, not just for the Jews but for Gentiles as well. Christ's light is for all of God's children all over the globe.

In France, to celebrate Epiphany, children from Christian homes often put oats in their shoes on the evening before January 6. The oats are for the camels of the "Wise Men." When they awaken the next morning, the children hope to find the oats gone and gifts left in their shoes.

And so, St. Paul's, as we move into this new year, into Epiphany and beyond, we can look forward to what is to come, and no matter what happens in 2024, we must always remember that we are in God's hands. As we hear the Epiphany Scriptures read in worship during Epiphany, the baby we just celebrated will be revealed to us as God's son, and we need to stay strong in our faith, let go and trust God, who gave us the gift of the baby Jesus.

We pray for strength and guidance and recognize the opportunities that the future holds. It's going to be a great year, filled with new beginnings and exciting opportunities, as you celebrate the installation of a new pastor and celebrate St. Paul's ministry in Carson City, all while working with a new pastor in fulfilling the ministry God has for St. Paul's future. God's mission for St. Paul's will be an epiphany as God reveals new and exciting ministry opportunities. And of course, you might just be a healthier congregation spiritually, emotionally, physically, and mentally, as individuals and as a whole. 



EPIPHANY, also called Feast of the Epiphany, Theophany, or Three Kings' Day, (from the Greek *epiphaneia*, "manifestation"), is a Christian holiday commemorating the first manifestation of

Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi, and the manifestation of his divinity, as it occurred at his baptism in the Jordan River and at his first miracle at Cana in Galilee. Epiphany is one of the three principal and oldest festival days of the Christian church (the other two are Easter and Christmas).

Roman Catholics, Lutherans, Anglicans, and other Western churches observe the feast on January 6, while some Eastern Orthodox churches celebrate Epiphany on January 19, since their Christmas Eve falls on January 6.

The festival originated in the Eastern church, where it at first included a commemoration of Christ's birth. In Rome by 354, Christ's birth was being celebrated on December 25, and later in the 4th century the church in Rome began celebrating Epiphany on January 6. In the Western church, the festival primarily commemorates the visit by the Magi to the infant Jesus, which is seen as evidence that Christ, the Jewish Messiah, came also for the salvation of Gentiles. In the East, it commemorates the baptism of Jesus and celebrates the revelation that the incarnate Christ was both fully God and fully man.

In the West, the evening preceding Epiphany is called Twelfth Night. The time between December 25 and January 6 is known as the Twelve Days of Christmas. Epiphany is celebrated with special pastries in many countries, and children often receive small gifts in their shoes in honor of the Magi's gifts to the infant Jesus. The holiday also has a number of traditions involving water as a reflection of Jesus's baptism, including the blessing of houses with holy water.

After holiday celebrations and ringing in the New Year, the winter months provide ample opportunity to deepen our faith lives as a family. Whether you're longing for the warmth again or embracing the snow, here are a few ideas for faith formation this winter:

The light of the world

The season of Epiphany is all about Jesus's light to the world. As a family, pick a country and learn all you can about its customs, people, language, food, and history. Find a recipe that lifts up the local flavors. Pray for the country and its people. Give thanks that God's light shines for them too. You can always connect with your companion synod and see how you can partner with them.

The light of nature

Even with a landscape of bare trees, nature provides plenty of opportunities to study God's creation. Go on a winter hike and use all your senses. Immerse yourself in the beauty. Look for signs of hope. Feed the birds. Make snow angels. As you walk, share with one another what you noticed and say a prayer of thanks for God's diverse creation.

Have worship in your home one day. Get together to pray, sing songs, read the Bible and bless one another. Your service doesn't have to be long or formal. Talk as a family about your favorite parts of worship and why. You can use your church's bulletins or make up your own order. Most importantly, have fun and take turns leading!

The light of nourishment

Who doesn't love warm soup on a cold night? Invite your neighbors to a **soup swap**. Everyone brings soup and extra containers so all get to take home a variety of soup. As you swap, you'll get to share family recipes, tell stories and deepen relationships with the people who live closest to you. You can even make extra soup for families who have new babies at home or for someone returning home from surgery or treatments.

The light of rest

Take time to simply be. Light candles. Sit by the fire. Turn off cellphones and televisions. Be together as a family. Read books or play games. Share your highs and lows. Look each other in the eyes. Know that in those still, quiet moments God's voice can be heard.
