President's Report September



This article is dedicated to communicating the actions, decisions, and future action items of the Church Council. It is intended to give the congregation the highlights of the Church Council meeting.

After a busy summer with family and friends, I welcome my favorite time of the year...autumn. I look forward to warm days, cool nights, watching football with my husband Greg, and having a little more routine back in my life.

At the July council meeting, the council elected Louise Griffith as President, Ken Beaton as Vice President, John Bradtke as Secretary, and Sharon Gesick as Treasurer. The other members of the council include Tim Hamilton, Ruth Fitzgerald, Nikki Rohrs, Nakita Jones, and Cody Lopez.

After a review of the budget, an error in addition was found. The budget that was approved by the congregation at the annual meeting was \$257,203.00. The corrected amount should be \$227,774.00 (decrease of \$29,429.00). Because line-item amounts did not change, the council did not feel it was necessary to call another congregational meeting.

The final numbers for our fiscal year ending July 31,2023:

Total Actual Income:	\$194,543.91
Total Actual Expenses:	\$193,077.43
Difference Income vs Expense:	\$ 1,466.48
Approved Budget 2022-2023:	\$238,909.00

Some other financial updates. By the time this newsletter has been published, we will have reached our goal of depositing \$20,000.00 into a separate bank account for moving and relocation expenses for a new pastor. However, due to cash flow, we have had to delay our contribution to the Sierra Pacific Synod/ELCA. During July and August, we had to transfer funds from our savings account to our checking account to meet payroll. As of the end of August, our savings will not cover one month of expenses. Like so many of us, we are living week to week on the offerings we receive. I know some of you have already increased your financial support of the church. Thank you!

Pastor Mike has spent a lot of time correcting the ELCA Congregation Report. We believe we now have a more accurate list of members and friends/family. According to our Constitution, members must take communion once per year and make a financial contribution. If you would like to make sure you are on the membership or friends/family list, you may email Brette at the church office with your contact information.

The Church Council will continue to meet on the third Thursday of each month at 6:00 p.m., except in December when we will take a Christmas break, and in June we will meet prior to the congregational annual meeting on June 9th. A meeting to review the budget for the fiscal year 2024-2025 has been planned for May 2024.

Pastor Mike, Ken Beaton, and I will attend the Sierra Pacific Synod Assembly as the representatives for St. Paul's on September 15-17, 2023, in Burlingame, California. During the assembly, we will be voting for a new Bishop, resolutions, and budget for the Synod. Tracy Angel will also be attending the assembly because she has been nominated to be an "at large member" to the Synod Council. We will have a guest speaker, and Jay Olshen will lead the service on Sunday, September 17th.

Plans are being made to extend the Memorial Garden and to place memorial stones for loved ones. Ashes may also be buried in the garden. If you would like more information, please talk to Pastor Mike.

The Call Committee has finalized the Ministry Site Profile and will be sending it to the Synod by the first week in September. Because of your contribution at the Call Committee Conversation meetings, they believe they have a very good document to present.

A meeting with the Carson City Superintendent, Pastor Mike, and St. Paul's members has been setup for September to discuss the purchase of the back property lot. The Church Council will also meet with the school district before making any recommendations to the congregation.

<u>God's Work, Our Hands</u> project is being led by Kim Neiman. We are hosting a Vitalant Blood Drive on Saturday, September 23rd. Please get the word out to neighbors, friends, community bulletin boards, your Facebook pages, employee lunchroom bulletin boards, grocery stores, email, and anywhere else you can think of. We have received a grant to support the costs of lunch for the staff and volunteers. This is the 10th Anniversary since the ELCA has adopted this slogan. It represents the connection we have between God and our community. So much of who we are is said in these simple four words.

I ask the congregation to unite in prayer each night at 8:00 p.m.







WHY DONATE BLOOD?

When you give blood, you have the potential to *help hospital patients within our community* and, when the need arises, others across the country.

Many people believe that most blood is needed after major disasters, yet daily personal emergencies and ongoing medical needs of thousands of patients require a constant and ready blood supply. It's the blood already on hospital shelves that saves lives.

Every day in the U.S., patients in hospitals, surgical centers and emergency treatment facilities need approximately:

29,000 units of red blood cells - 5,000 units of platelets - 6,500 units of plasma

The need is real. The goal is 24 donations. Come be a part of the solution! See you there!



Donating Blood on September 23rd or Just Want to Work on Increasing Your Iron Level?

Our blood drive for "God's Work, Our Hands" is September 23rd here at St. Paul's in Fellowship Hall. In order to be able to donate successfully, one factor is to have a high enough hemoglobin level. This will be checked with a tiny stick of your fingertip prior to your donating blood. If you've ever been told you have "iron poor blood" or "low hemoglobin" or you just want to know more, here are some foods that can help raise your iron level, and thereby your hemoglobin level.

Eat foods high in iron and folate

Iron plays an important role in hemoglobin production. A protein called transferrin binds to iron and transports it throughout the body. This helps your body make red blood cells, which contain hemoglobin.

The first step toward raising your hemoglobin level on your own is to start eating more iron. Foods that are high in iron include:

liver and organ meats shellfishbeef broccolikale spinach

Folate is a B vitamin that your body uses to produce heme, the part of your red blood cells that contains hemoglobin. Without enough folate, your red blood cells can't mature. This can lead to folate deficiency anemia and low hemoglobin levels.

You can add folate to your diet by eating more:

beef spinach
black-eyed peas avocado
lettuce rice
kidney beans peanuts

This is not funny but a very touching story.

I was at the corner grocery store buying some early potatoes. I noticed a small boy, delicate of bone and feature, ragged but clean, hungrily apprising a basket of freshly picked green peas.

I paid for my potatoes but was also drawn to the display of fresh green peas. I am a pushover for creamed peas and new potatoes. Pondering the peas, I couldn't help overhearing the conversation between Mr. Miller (the store owner) and the ragged boy next to me.

"Hello, Barry, how are you today?"

"H'lo, Mr. Miller. Fine, thank ya. Jus' admirin' them peas. They sure look good."

"They are good, Barry. How's your Ma?"

"Fine. Gittin' stronger alla' time."

"Good. Anything I can help you with?"

"No, Sir. Jus' admirin' them peas."

"Would you like take some home?" asked Mr. Miller.

"No, Sir. Got nuthin' to pay for 'em with."

"Well, what have you to trade me for some of those peas?"

"All I got's my prize marble here."

"Is that right? Let me see it," said Mr. Miller.

"Here 'tis. She's a dandy."

"I can see that. Hmm, only thing is this one is blue, and I sort of go for red. Do you have a red one like this at home?" the store owner asked.

"Not zackley but almost."

"Tell you what. Take this sack of peas home with you and next trip this way let me look at that red marble," Mr. Miller told the boy.

"Sure will. Thanks Mr. Miller."

Mrs. Miller, who had been standing nearby, came over to help me. With a smile she said, "There are two other boys like him in town, all three are in very poor circumstances. Jim just loves to bargain with them for peas, apples, tomatoes, or whatever. When they come back with their red marbles, and they always do, he decides he doesn't like red after all, and he sends them home with a bag of produce for a green marble or an orange one, when they come on their next trip to the store."

I left the store, smiling to myself, impressed with this man. A short time later I moved to Colorado, but I never forgot the story of this man, the boys, and their bartering for marbles.

Several years went by, each more rapid than the previous one. Just recently I had occasion to visit some old friends in that Idaho community, and while I was there, learned that Mr. Miller had died. They were having his visitation that evening, and knowing my friends wanted to go, I agreed to accompany them. Upon arrival at the mortuary, we fell into line to meet the relatives of the deceased and to offer whatever words of comfort we could.

Ahead of us in line were three young men. One was in an army uniform and the other two had nice haircuts, wore dark suits and white shirts...all very professional looking. They approached Mrs. Miller standing composed and smiling by her husband's casket. Each of the young men hugged her, kissed her on the cheek, spoke briefly with her and moved on to the casket.

Her misty light-blue eyes followed them as one by one each young man stopped briefly and placed his own warm hand over the cold pale hand in the casket. Each left the mortuary awkwardly, wiping his eyes.

Our turn came to meet Mrs. Miller. I told her who I was and reminded her of the story from those many years ago and what she had told me about her husband's bartering for marbles. With her eyes glistening, she took my hand and led me to the casket.

"Those three young men who just left were those boys. They just told me how they appreciated the things Jim "traded" them. Now, at last, when Jim could not change his mind about color or size...they came to pay their debt."

"We've never had a great deal of the wealth of this world," she confided, "but right now, Jim would consider himself the richest man in Idaho."

With loving gentleness, she lifted the lifeless fingers of her deceased husband. Resting underneath were three exquisitely shined red marbles.

We will not be remembered by our words, but by our kind deeds

Today I wish you a day of ordinary miracles. A fresh pot of coffee you didn't make yourself. An unexpected phone call from an old friend. Green lights on your way to an appointment. The fastest line at the grocery store. A good sing-along song on the radio. Your keys found right where you left them.

Never be in way too much of a hurry to even notice the ordinary miracles when they occur.




